From the Pastor's Desk

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." Philippians 4: 6-7

Like Brewster, we see the world changing around us, with no possible way to comprehend where we are going and whether or not we are invited along for the ride! And yet, the road before us (however unfamiliar) is full of possibilities.

In Philippians 4 we are coached to not let anxiety get too firm a hold on us. We are told that when worries come our way, our Lord is ready to hear our prayers and hear the heaviness of our hearts. Philippians reminds us that we are grounded in Christ and the peace of God.

Uncertainties, challenges and frustrations come our way every day, but we can deal with them because we are rooted in Jesus.

We collected 51 boxes of cereal for Christian Neighbors. Thank you all for donating! Coming up on **July 14th**, we will have our **Noisy Offering** for Seafarer's Friend. Be sure to continue setting your change aside to bring in that Sunday!

Our summer Missions Partnership is Seafarers Friend! Seafarer's Friend has been tending to the spiritual needs of the maritime community since 1827! When merchant sailers or commercial fishing workers come to port in Boston (and in other locations throughout New England), Seafarer's Friend chaplains and volunteers are there to meet them. They visit seafarers aboard the ships, host them at their office where they can clean themselves up, contact their families, and get connected with resources that they need.

Volunteers help provide transportation to shopping centers, boarding houses and recreational activities while seafarers are in port. Seafarer's Friend also helps advocate for safe working conditions aboard ships, and for seafarers' health and living conditions in port and out to sea.

Seafarer's Friend is a long standing ministry partner within the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches.

Also, everyone is invited to bring in toiletry items to fill care packages -Ditty Bags - which will be assembled on **July 24th**, **12pm** by the Women's Fellowship and the Cub Scouts.

In early August, our Ditty Bags will catch a ride out to New England with students attending the Boston Seminar (an educational program put on by the NACCC) and then delivered to the Seafarer's Friend office in Boston.

The <u>Theological Commission of the International Congregational Fellowship (ICF)</u> and the <u>Congregational Library & Ar-</u> <u>chives</u> are delighted to sponsor a virtual, half-day conference on the theme, **"Mission and Transmission: Walking in the Congregational Way."**

This virtual conference will be held **Wednesday, July 17, 2024, from 12:00-5:00 pm Eastern Time via Zoom**. Participants from around the world can take part. Registration is free. A sign up sheet will be available on the welcome table. **As a church we will gather in the Chapel to participate together.**

The Congregational Way is an expression of Christianity in every part of the world. For some, it was spread through the mission agencies of the USA and UK. In other places, it was transmitted through shifts in population as a result of persecution and conflict, or exploration and seeking new lives. But, it has also arisen as a natural response to the Gospel, as God calls communities to express their lives in freedom.

Dr. Brian Fiu Kolia, an ordained minister of the Congregational Christian Church Samoa and a lecturer in Hebrew Bible/Old Testament at Malua Theological College, will be the keynote speaker. Those who attended last summer's ICF meeting were both blessed and impressed with Brian's vast knowledge and approachability.

Brian's keynote, titled "A Changing Church *but* an Unchanged Bible: Congregationalism in Samoa and the Diaspora," will look at how the Samoan Congregational Church has changed face from its traditional form in Samoa to its form in diasporic communities, becoming spaces for the maintaining of Samoan culture and language while fostering communities and networking, a somewhat decolonized version of the Samoan Congregational Church. Yet despite this, reading and interpretation of the Bible and its subsequent theologies have remained subdued under the tight colonial grip of traditional Western applications and methodology/ies. Such Westernized readings fail to recognize Samoan concerns and questions of identity in diasporic lands. Brian's talk will explain the need for decolonial readings that reflect the changing decolonizing church, which seeks to embrace Samoan native-ness in reading and interpretation.

- As of 5/31/24 we had \$175 in our General Fund Checking compared with last year's \$35,040 (2023 includes campaign).
- Heritage Fund YTD gain/loss, transfers and expenses has our unrestricted balance down \$2538.
- YTD money market transfers \$20,000. 5/31 Unrestricted Heritage Fund Balance is 91,723.
- May Budgeted Expenses are \$16,874 (includes \$4100 steps). Collections \$7171.
- YTD Expenses are \$11,820 over budget. Collections are \$4088 under budget.
